


Why Church Records?

- In use before or instead of civil registration
- Slave research

Which Church?

- Present affiliation
- Will or tombstone
- Only church in vicinity, circuit rider
- Birth, marriage or death record
 - Usually at bride/mother's church
- Check siblings
- National tradition, language






Marriage

- Puritans viewed marriage as civil contract
- South Carolina did not begin civil registration until 1911
- Names of bride and groom, parents,

residences, birth dates, baptism records








Death, Burial

- Many church registers give place of birth – immigrants
- Date maybe burial, not death

Confirmation, Communicant

- Can be just a list of names and dates
- Lutheran, Episcopal records are extremely detailed: names, dates, residences




